# (Somewhat) Guilty Pleasure Series: Let's Go Shopping!

Shall we window shop on the web together?

Patient library staff take us for a spin around sites like Amazon, eBay, Craigslist, local stores, SFPL's subscription to Consumer Reports and Bay Area Consumer Checkbook, while sharing tips for being a savvy and safe online shopper.

#### Some Basic Online Tips

- **ö** Be miserly about sharing your personal information.
- Only make purchases or transmit confidential information from websites that you are sure are legitimate, the address is typed correctly, and have a green padlock icon and https in the address/URL.
- Be careful of clicking links in emails and websites. Rest the cursor over a link to check the actual address you may be surprised, perhaps dismayed. It is generally better to type in an address directly (and accurately of course) or possibly use a link from a successful Google search. Create bookmarks / favorites for shopping and financial sites you use often.
- **5 Don't download** software **unless you are certain it is legitimate and useful**. There is a lot of dubious, destructive, and downright dastardly software out there. Leave it out there, even if it sounds enticing.
- **i** Use tricky to figure out passwords. Don't use the same password for all accounts. Update them regularly. Don't forget them.
- **i** Consider using **password manager** software (but don't forget the password to that service). <u>LastPass</u> is a popular program that offers a free version.
- **i** Make sure that you **fully log out** from sites, close the browser, and possibly restart the machine when using a public or shared computer.
- **i** Use **Incognito / Private Browsing** modes if you would like your browsing history, etc. deleted when done with a session.
- **š** EFF (<u>Electronic Frontier Foundation</u>) has a great deal of information on privacy and security issues. They also have a free browser plug-in called Privacy Badger which can help **prevent sites from tracking you** when online.
- **i** Be **wary** of the seductive world **of consumerism**. Pause and consider if you really need (and can afford) an item before you click that buy button.
- **š** Is it an item that you can **borrow from friends, family, library**, etc.?
- i Is it something that you can purchase locally? Do you want to support local shops, spend time with others, and cut down on shipping materials, fuel, etc.?
- **š** Factor in **shipping costs** to the final price.
- **i** What is the **return policy**? Is there a restocking fee?
- **i** Will someone be available to **accept delivery** of the item?
- **i** If purchasing a used item, are you seeing a **photo of the actual item**?
