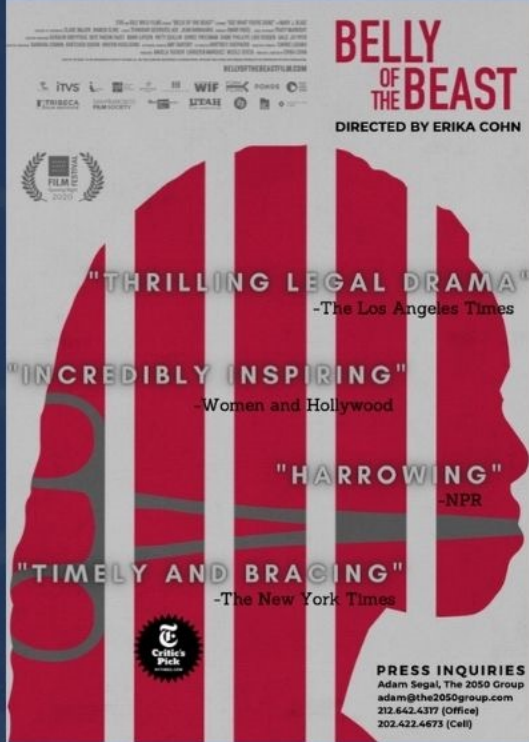

Typical "tank" now in use at San Quentin. Five men to a room 7' 8" x 11' 8" x 7' 11". Note that there are no toilet facilities; sewage is disposed of by use of buckets. This "tank" is located in a building erected in 1850. Forty-eight such tanks are now in use.

SAN QUENTIN PRISONERS HEAR RADIO PROGRAMS

TWO PRISONERS IN SAN QUENTIN PRISON LISTEN TO RADIO PROGRAMS THROUGH EARPHONES IN THEIR CELL OVER A NEW SYSTEM PUT IN OPERATION AUG. 24, GIVING THE PRISONERS RADIO RECEPTION IN THE PENITENTIARY FOR THE FIRST TIME. THE SYSTEM COST \$6,000 AND WAS FINANCED BY THE PRISON'S 4,000 PRISONERS THROUGH THEIR LIBRARY FUND.

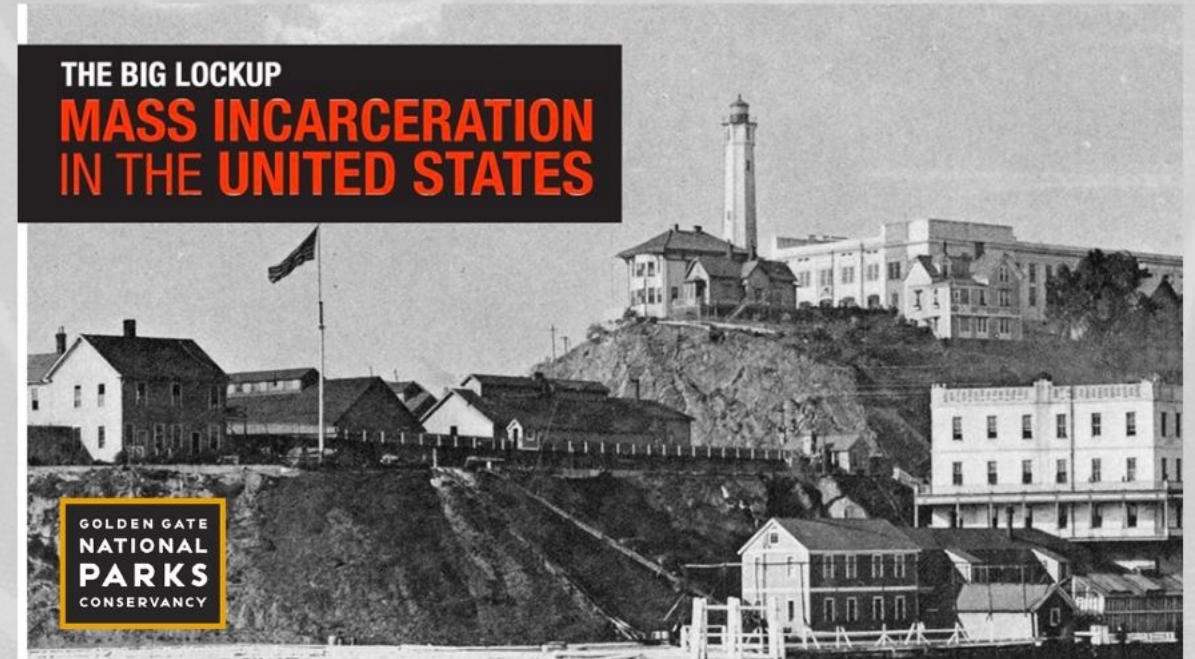
