## Dear San Francisco Residents,



This past year was incredibly affirming for San Francisco Public Library (SFPL) thanks to YOU! On November 8, 2022, you voted to renew the Library Preservation Fund (Prop F), securing the future of our beloved library system for the next 25 years. And you

did it with an unprecedented 83% of the vote! We feel the LOVE and we are so grateful for your support, which has made us one of the highest rated departments in City government.

The Library Preservation Fund (LPF) is our largest budget source, measuring 99% percent of the Fiscal Year 2022–23 budget of \$185.7 million. Since its adoption in 1994, the LPF has enabled us to expand our hours, upgrade our facilities, present thousands of free public programs annually, provide access to resources in different languages and in our jail system, eliminate overdue fines and so much more. At 11% of our budget, SFPL maintains one of the largest collections and materials budgets per capita, among U.S. libraries. According to the 2022 California State Library Survey, San Francisco has the highest circulation per capita amongst urban libraries in the state. Our circulation is among the top 15 urban public libraries in the country with more than 9,000 physical and 15,000 electronic materials checked out daily. This year, we hit a new record with 12 million checked-out items, exceeding our pre-pandemic circulation. We are proud to serve an average of 10,000 patrons per day and to be one of the largest free providers of high-speed Internet and Wi-Fi in the City.

The following pages further illustrate the incredible work we do that is made possible by your robust investment in library services. But we don't plan to rest on our laurels. With the incredible mandate we received from you last November, we know we need to continually evolve and remain responsive to community needs. Currently, we are deep into the most ambitious and comprehensive strategic planning process ever undertaken by any major urban library in the country. We have held 20 community stakeholder focus groups covering each district and in multiple languages; conducted 2,000 branch user intercept surveys; administered an internal survey and employee engagement sessions; interviewed numerous City department heads and gathered feedback from more than 500 participants at this year's Night of Ideas. Now we are synthesizing this data to help us reimagine what library service in the 21st century looks like in San Francisco.

We have big plans for our future, and those plans center YOU, so stay tuned for the final plan early in the new year. In the meantime, I hope you enjoy this look back on another remarkable year. We thank you for your ongoing support and patronage.

This year, we added a new colleague to our executive leadership team; Dolly Goyal, our Chief of Public Services. In her role, she oversees the Public Services divisions: Main Library, Branches, Collections & Technical Services and Community Programs and Partnerships.

She has more than 15 years of experience working in some of the Bay Area's most innovative urban library systems. Most recently, she was the Assistant City

Librarian for the Santa Clara City Library.
A leader in the profession, she was elected to serve as the President of the California Library Association in 2018.
Previous to that she was a 2014 American Library Association (ALA) Emerging Leader and a 2012 Eureka! Institute Fellow. She is also a member of REFORMA, Library Leadership & Management Association and locally, the Bay Area Young Adult Librarians.

Our very own Ocean View Branch Manager Jaena Rae Cabrera received a *Library Journal's Movers & Shakers* Award. Jaena is super dedicated to her work and to public service. She actively leads the Asian Pacific American Library Association (APALA) as President-Elect of the executive board. She is also involved in the LIS community as the Editor in Chief of WOC+Lib, an online forum that features the work of BIPOC library and archives workers. She also edits *In the Library with the Lead Pipe*, a peer-reviewed journal that publishes articles from diverse perspectives.


Since becoming a permanent librarian in 2017, Jaena has championed growing the Library's Filipino offerings. She organized two large literary programs at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art in conjunction with the Library, attracting more than 300 patrons to hear Filipino poetry and prose. She also helped plan the 6th Annual Filipino American International Book Festival, the largest festival of its kind in the United States, bringing more than 40 Filipino literary figures to San Francisco. Jaena trained to be a mental health first aid worker to better understand Filipino issues and trauma and is currently earning her associate degree in Philippine Studies while working full time.

On June 30, 2023, Susan Goldstein, the City
Archivist for 28 years, embarked on her next great
adventure: retirement. During Susan's tenure,
SFPL dramatically improved public access to its
historic collections. Career highlights include the
creation of an innovative crowdsourced photo
archive, Shades of San Francisco, which includes
personal family photographs that reflect and
celebrate the ethnic and cultural diversity of the
Bayview, Western Addition, Mission, Ocean View,
Merced, Ingleside and Sunset neighborhoods as
well as our LGBTQIA+ and Filipino communities.
She was instrumental in securing a grant from the
National Endowment for Humanities to establish
an archive of collections related to the early AIDS

epidemic in collaboration with the University of San Francisco and the GLBT Historical Society. She also won grants to preserve the work of the groundbreaking Filipino arts nonprofit Kularts and to digitize two historic African American newspapers, *The Hunter's Point Beacon* and *The Spokesman*, and the *Bay Area Times/Coming Up*, a LGBTQ newspaper started in 1978. During the Covid-19 shutdown, she established the Covid-19 Community Time Capsule to document the pandemic throughout the City. She successfully solicited and received collections from Mayors Jordan, Agnos, Brown, Newsom and Lee, the Board of Supervisors and a wide range of City and County departments. She will be missed!



- Helping SFPL remain one of the best libraries in the US, by supporting leadership development, service innovation and implementation of the Library's Racial Equity Action Plan.



### San Francisco's First SFPL Book Stop

On February 18, San Francisco Public Library unveiled the City's first-ever SFPL Book Stop, an automated book kiosk at Treasure Island's Island Cove Market. The kiosk is pre-stocked with assorted titles and available for community use during market hours.

The ribbon cutting was attended by community members, District 6 Supervisor Matt Dorsey, City Librarian Michael Lambert, Treasure Island Development Authority (TIDA) Board of Directors Vice-President Linda Richardson, SFPL Commission President Connie Wolf, Abdo Nasseri, owner of the Island Cove Market and Marie Ciepiela, Executive Director of the Friends and Foundation of the San Francisco Public Library, which provided funding for the inaugural kiosk.









## San Francisco County Jail First in the Nation to Provide Free Access to Tablet Computers

The San Francisco Sheriff's Office, in partnership with the Mayor's Office, San Francisco Public Library, the Financial Justice Project in the Treasurer's Office and the SF Jail Justice Coalition, launched a groundbreaking tablet program with access to never-before-offered free content for incarcerated people in its county jails.

Nine years ago, the Sheriff's Office initiated free tablet technology to enhance education and learning for people in its custody. The Mayor's Office committed \$500,000 annually from the City's General Fund to support the program's implementation and maintenance. Unlike other similar tablet programs in jails and prisons nationwide which charge incarcerated people fees, this initiative ensures that every service

view important legal and reentry
resources, make commissary orders
and medical requests and submit
grievances. Thanks to SFPL, which
leveraged its hoopla digital platform,
incarcerated people now have
the ability to stream a wide range
of free media, including books,
entertainment and music, curated
by longtime Jail & Reentry Services
librarians Rachel Kinnon, Dr. Jeanie
Austin and Nili Ness.



## **Digi Center Opening**





Just in time for the holidays, SFPL made it easy for patrons to bring their memories into the 21st century with a new DIY Digi Lab. Located on the 5th Floor of the Main Library, the Lab is equipped so the public can independently digitize personal videotapes (yes, including VHS formats!), audiocassettes, 8 mm or Super8 film reels, photographs, slides, negatives, papers and floppy disks.

The Digi Center expanded their workstations from one to three since opening and has served close to 100 patrons to date. "We've been booked solid, with requests for higher capacity," says Digi Center Manager Dee Dee Kramer.







This summer, San Franciscans were able to enjoy unprecedented access to K-Fai Steele, the 2023 Summer Stride artist. In partnership with local publisher Chronicle Books and the Friends of the San Francisco Public Library, SFPL hosted Steele at seven events at the Main Library, branches and the Friends' block party on Potrero Hill. Additionally, Steele led a nature-inspired sketching workshop in the gardens of Alcatraz Island alongside National Park Service Ranger Oliver and threw an "Arty Search Party" during a Free Family Day at SFMOMA, resulting in a unique "by kids, for kids" guide to the museum.





## **One City One Book**



The pioneering nonfiction book *This Is Ear Hustle* by acclaimed podcasters Earlonne Woods and Nigel Poor was selected as this year's One City One Book all-city read. Longtime fans of libraries, Woods and Poor visited every SFPL location prior to their showcase author event. And throughout fall 2022, San Franciscans were treated to 28 total programs related to the themes of the book, including racist policing, prisoner advocacy and activism and arts education in prisons. In addition to these events, original drawings from the book by formerly incarcerated artist Damien Linnane were exhibited in the Main Library's Atrium and a display of portraits from Facing Life, a multimedia project by journalist/educator Pendarvis Harshaw and documentary photographer and filmmaker Brandon Tauszik.

## **Artist in Residence Program**

## Creativity Explored Library Card Contest

For 40 years, the San Francisco-based nonprofit Creativity Explored has cultivated the artistic talents of developmentally disabled adults, delighting and inspiring audiences around the country. In honor of its anniversary, the studio-based collective partnered with San Francisco Public Library to bring a unique exhibition/competition, Library Cards by Creativity Explored, featuring 30 reproductions of artworks inspired by the library, to the Main Library's 4th Floor. From February 18 to March 31, more than 2,700 people voted in person or online for their favorite works. The five winners were: Isaias Gomez, Andrew Wong, Guadalupe Ramos, Nubia Ortega and Hiro Medina. Their designs are now available at every location.



## **Return of Potrero Branch exhibition**



On May 20, the Potrero Branch Library once again opened its doors for an artist reception celebrating the talent of neighborhood residents. The 62nd Annual Potrero Hill Artists' Exhibition is one of the City's longest-running annual exhibitions and features a broad array of styles from painting to prints, photography to textiles, pottery to sculpture and everything in between.

The 27th annual Effie Lee Morris Lecture was held in person for the first time since 2019. This year's honoree, Dr. Jewell Parker Rhodes, spoke on "Words as Witness, Words as Healing" to a multi-generational audience. She also participated in a virtual class visit with youth from El Dorado Elementary and San Francisco Community School.

Students in the two schools had read her books as part of SFPL's Effie Lee Morris OWLs Book Club. Her numerous award-winning and bestselling books for young people include *Ghost Boys*, *Paradise on Fire*, *Bayou Magic* (part of the Louisiana Girls trilogy), *Black Brother*, *Black Brother* and many others.





### **PRIDE**

San Francisco Public Library went all out for Pride this year. In addition to participating in the parade for which we won the Absolutely Fabulous Award, the Library hosted a series of programs for all ages. Highlights include Drag Story Hours, Pride-themed crafts, film screenings and author talks. ### **First Partner Visit**



This summer, California First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom was joined by Mayor London N. Breed, City Librarian Michael Lambert, California State Librarian Greg Lucas and CA Poet Laureate Lee Herrick for a tour of The Mix. Thirty San Francisco teenagers involved in the Library's Youth Engaged in Library Leadership (YELL) program participated in a series of poetry, dance and creative workshops and presented a showcase in honor of the First Partner.

## **Bay Beats Launch**

On April 26, San Francisco Public Library announced the launch of a new streaming platform, Bay Beats, to provide local talent with a platform for expanding their audiences and reach. From May 1 through July 31, 2023, the Library accepted submissions for consideration from across all genres, from Jazz to Soul, Rap to Rock, Classical to Noise and everything in between.

All music lovers, even those without an SFPL library card, can stream commercial-free, curated music on Bay Beats when it launches in the fall of 2023. As an additional bonus, the Bay Beats platform includes links to artists' websites so fans can find out about live shows and buy music and merchandise. With this new platform, SFPL is providing a much-needed showcase for local musical talent.





## Racial Equity Work at the Library



As San Francisco Public Library continues to build a culture, space and workplace that is accessible and welcoming to all current and future employees, we've developed and nurtured several important practices to support Phase I of the Racial Equity Plan

With great success, we continue to develop a culture of learning by sharing with staff the most current best practices for cultivating workplace equity. During the year, we covered topics such as managing implicit bias and microaggressions.

Last year, we relaunched the monthly Racial Equity Committee (REC) meetings where we plan the racial equity work. We created internal opportunities that support a culture of learning among Library staff. Racial Equity at the Library (R.E.A.L.) Talks 2.0 was born in response to staff wanting to increase their opportunities to discuss and explore racial equity at work. Structured as an informal



conference, the inaugural R.E.A.L. Talk 2.0 provided a way to engage staff and build community around racial equity topics that we believe are important and relevant to library life and culture. Discussion topics included:

Language Justice: multilingualism among staff

Flip the Script: Imposter syndrome, professionalism and public libraries

Cultural Competency in Programming: What do culturally affirming programs and spaces look like at SFPL?


To keep staff updated, we relaunched the Racial Equity Newsletter to highlight the current work that is underway at SFPL and in the wider community, helping us bridge SFPL with what is happening around us, reminding us that we are not alone in this work.

We were fortunate to hire SF Fellow Hernan Soto who came with a fresh



set of podcasting skills, and with the support of the REC, launched the first R.E.A.L. Podcast where we frame the racial equity work through the lens of storytelling by historically resilient communities.

Lastly, we relaunched the BIPOC and LGBTQIA<sup>+</sup> Affinity groups in order to provide a safe space to share common experiences and to invite staff to continue the conversation on how to take actions toward creating a transformative institution—actions that require all hands on deck.






















## **Capital Project Update**









On September 14, Mayor Breed announced \$13.2 million in grants awarded through California's Building Forward Library Improvement Grant Program to renovate the historic Mission and Chinatown/Him Mark Lai branches. The grants provide the needed funding to upgrade both branches to state-of-the-art library facilities while maintaining their historic significance.

The California State Library Building Forward initiative awarded the Mission Branch project \$5.2 million and the Chinatown/Him Mark Lai Branch renovation nearly \$8 million. In addition to library service improvements, the library branch renovation projects will upgrade the obsolete HVAC systems in both buildings so they can serve in the future as cooling and clean air respite centers for the community.

Both renovations are designed to be LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Gold certified and to advance San Francisco's Climate Action Plan goals to achieve net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2040. The goal is for both libraries to become fully electric, eliminating natural gas heating and taking advantage of the City's municipal hydroelectric power. The Mission Branch Library will add rooftop solar panels and the Chinatown Branch Library will upgrade its existing solar panels, providing renewable power.

Prior to being awarded grant monies, the Library set aside funding accumulated through the Library Preservation and General Funds to support the renovation of both branches. The Building Forward Library Improvement grant enables the Library to cover cost increases caused by the pandemic and inflation.
