



New Year, New Mind: Online Mental Health Resources

2024 brings us the chance to start fresh. Perhaps you are interested in bettering your mental health? SFPL has online resources that can help you on this quest.

GetSetUp offers live and recorded classes that are accessible 24/7. You can attend Qigong lessons and improve focus. You can take a course on "Creating Healthy Boundaries." During the live courses, the guide will answer your questions on the spot. Depending on your interests, you can learn about the "Science of Wellbeing," or "Coping with Stress using Music and Movement."

Udemy offers hundreds of recorded courses on topics such as: "Smart Tips: Managing Stress," "The Psychology of Older Age," "How I Overcame Social Anxiety, Grew Confidence and Self-esteem." The lectures are broken down into bite-sized chunks, some of which are as short as 5 minutes, so you can fit them into a busy day.

Hoopla offers The Great Courses, and you can take a recorded class on "Stress and Your Body" or "Practicing Mindfulness."

Les Nickelettes Photographs and Papers

rue San Francisco originals, Les Nickelettes were an all-female experimental comedy troupe active from 1972 to 1985 in the San Francisco Bay Area. The group got their start as the opening act to the People's Nickelodeon, a late-night showing of old films at the Mitchell Brothers' O'Farrell Theater. Les Nickelettes soon brought their raunchy, feminist humor, propulsive DIY energy and satirical song-anddance routines to residencies at Mabuhay Gardens and the Intersection Theater. Beginning in 1975 until their final performance in 1985, they wrote and performed in original, full-length musical comedies with all-female casts across the Bay Area.

The more you learn about Les Nickelettes, the more you see how connected they were to the San Francisco art, music and theater scenes in the '70s and '80s. The collection contains playbills, flyers, newsletters, newspaper and magazine clippings and photographs.

Matthew Desmond's Poverty, by America

SFPL + City Arts & Lectures presents Poverty, by America



Matthew Desmond

atthew Desmond, Pulitzer Prize-winning author of Evicted, explores America's wealth-poverty paradox in Poverty, by America. In partnership with City Arts & Lectures, Desmond engages in a conversation with Bernice Yeung, managing editor of the Investigative Reporting Program at UC Berkeley. The book exposes a system that exploits workers, suppresses unions, overcharges the poor and unevenly distributes federal aid. Desmond examines entrenched poverty through underfunding in education, mass transit and healthcare, resulting in private opulence and

public squalor. Advocating for the elimination of residential segregation, Desmond issues a poignant call for comprehensive antipoverty reforms, urging readers to confront their role in perpetuating poverty.
