

Ma will be in conversation with Natalie Baszile, author of Queen Sugar and We Are Each Other's Harvest: Celebrating African American Farmers, Land, and Legacy.

About the Book Kathryn Ma's The Chinese Groove follows the journey of 18-year-old Shelley, who leaves his home in China's Yunnan Province to seek a brighter future in the United States. Encountering familial fractures and unmet expectations upon his arrival,

Shelley navigates the complexities of immigrant life in present-day San Francisco.

About the Author Kathryn Ma is the author of the widely praised novel The Year She Left Us, which was named a New York Times Editors' Choice and an NPR "Great Read" of the year. Her short story collection, All That Work and Still No Boys, won the Iowa Short Fiction Award and was named a San Francisco Chronicle Notable Book and a Los Angeles Times Discoveries Book. She is also a recipient of the David Nathan Meyerson Prize for Fiction and has twice been named a San Francisco Public Library Laureate.


Collections Corner: Celebrate National Poetry Month



he Book Arts & Special Collection Center is fortunate to hold the papers of San Francisco Associated with the Beat Generation and

as Allen Ginsberg and Philip Lamantia, Winslow turned to surrealism, producing several books of poetry including the posthumously published A Daisy in the Memory of a Shark (City Lights, Pocket Poet Series, 31; 1973). The Pete Winslow Papers (BASC 8) consists of correspondence, notes, manuscripts, periodicals in which his poetry appears; Winslow's own published works as well as those who influenced his poetry; photographs and audio recordings. Winslow's poetry readings (1958-1965) were recorded on reel-to-reel tapes, which have been digitized to compact discs and are available to the public. Early appearances by stand-up comedian Mort Sahl, musicians Country Joe McDonald and Robbie Basho were discovered by librarians, adding even more color to the life of the poet.
