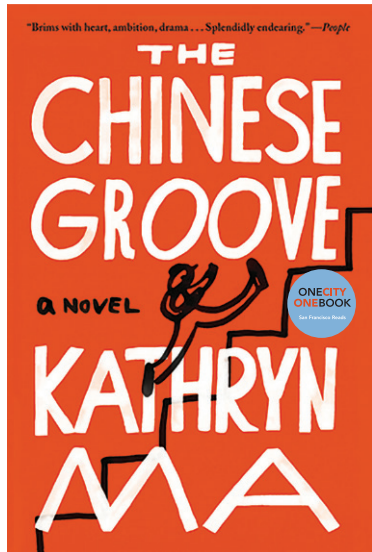

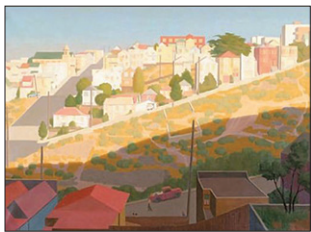
May Open Houses

Ralph Chessé: A San Francisco Century

On the second floor of the iconic Coit Tower, there's a modest mural by Ralph Chessé, a prolific but little-known San Francisco artist. The mural is his most visible and enduring legacy, but Chessé was a true Renaissance man. SFPL has partnered with curator Glen Helfand and the Chessé family to bring to the public the untold story of a pioneering artist's deep connection to San Francisco through a diverse range of artwork.

Born in 1900 in New Orleans, Chessé spent the bulk of his life in the Bay Area, and his artistic endeavors—painting, sculpture and notably, marionette production and performance—reflect numerous touchstones of the Bay Area's cultural and social life, from the WPA to theater, television and rock and roll. Until his passing in 1991, his life was fueled by creative endeavors as he explored different styles of art and even theatrical pursuits. His expressive, exquisitely carved puppets enacted everything from Shakespeare's tragedies to the teachings of animal kingdom educator Brother Buzz, in a beloved children's show that ran from 1953 to 1969 on mainstream television and was syndicated nationally. On view at the Main Library, *Ralph Chessé: A San Francisco Century* offers an overview of the artist's work, including rare puppets, paintings, woodcuts, photographs and documents that highlight his unique and under-recognized place in the City's history.

Collections Corner:

The Secret Life of Plants

Since it's May, and the sun is coaxing out new life, we are highlighting a few small archival collections that present San Francisco's flowers and plants as seen through different lenses, whether aesthetic, scientific or commercial.

The Ernest Clayton Collection of California Wild Flowers holds 200 original watercolors painted in the 1940s. The Eugene A. Upton horticulture scrapbook (1869–1877) is an inventory of Upton's flower and plant stock at his nursery on Scott Street near Turk. Our James G. Steele scrapbook holds a 19th-century collection of clippings and ephemera; Steele, a pharmacist specializing in medicinal plants, was one of the founders of the California College of Pharmacy. The John McLaren Collection includes McLaren's daybooks for plantings on San Mateo County estates, his correspondence with clients in San Francisco, and his reference library, with classic horticulture works dating from 1803.

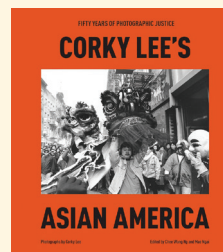

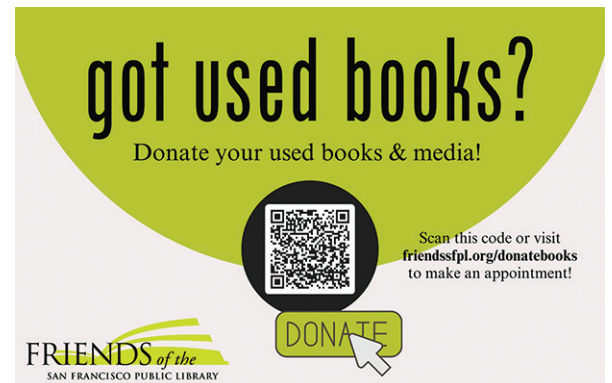

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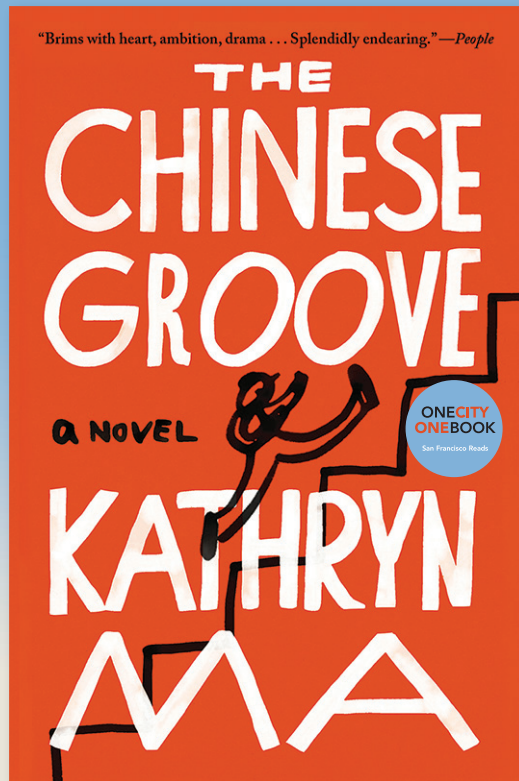
