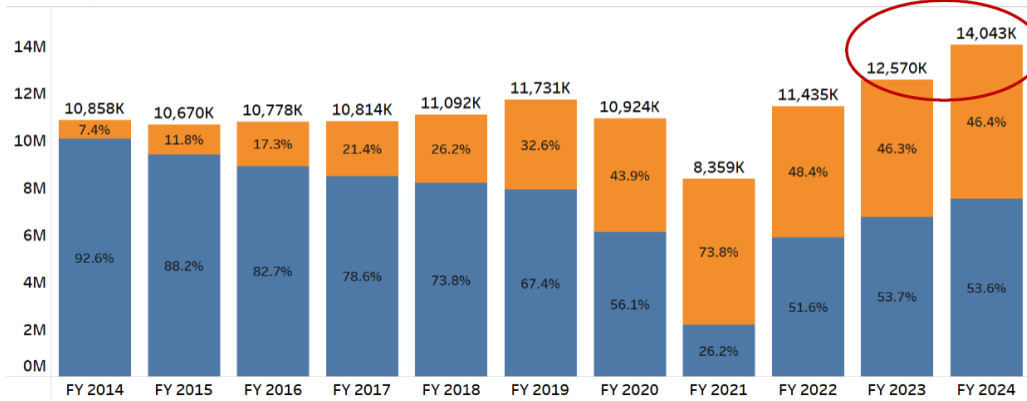
City Librarian’s Report – Michael Lambert

SFPL Physical vs eMaterial Circulation

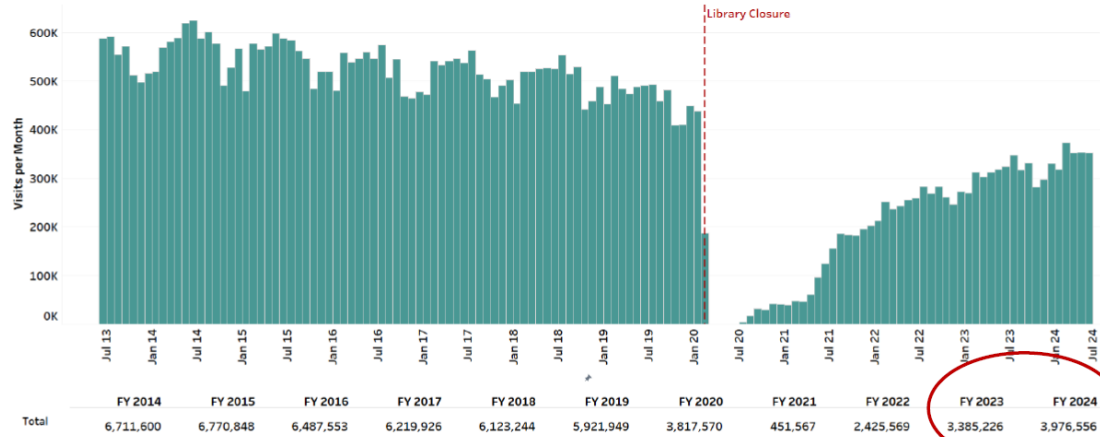


Visits

SFPL Visits: FY14-FY24

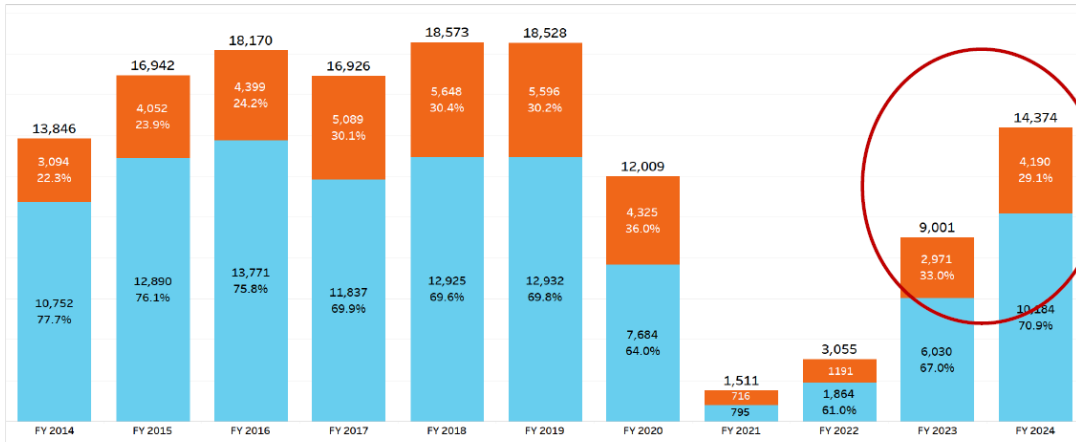
SFPL Fiscal Year Runs July 1 - June 30



Programs

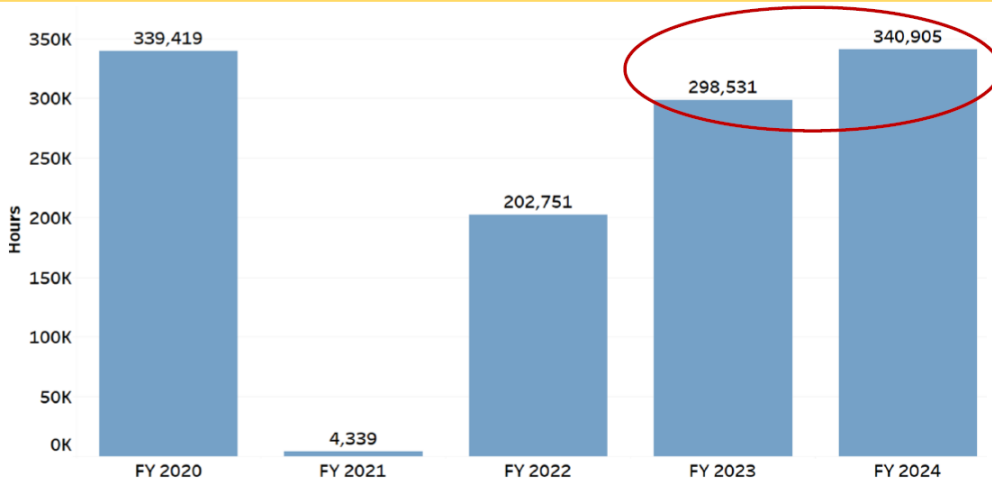
SFPL offered 60% more programs in FY24

SFPL Youth vs Adult Programs



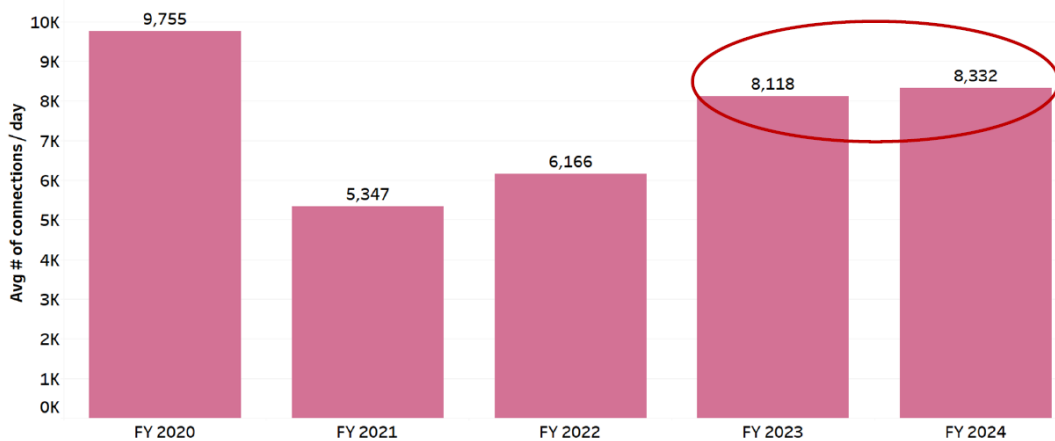
Public Computers

Wifi Usage

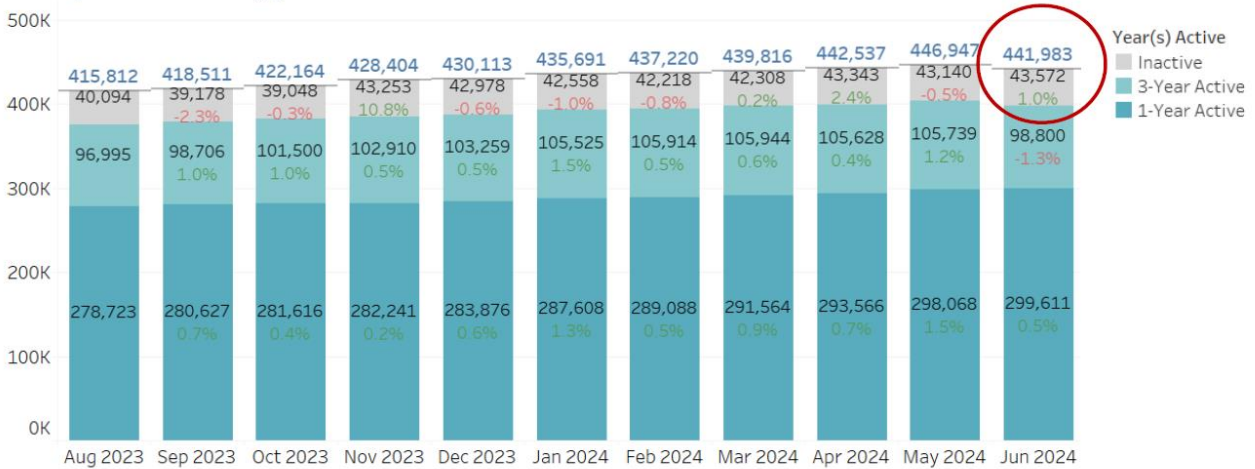
WiFi connections increased by 3% from FY23



Cardholders

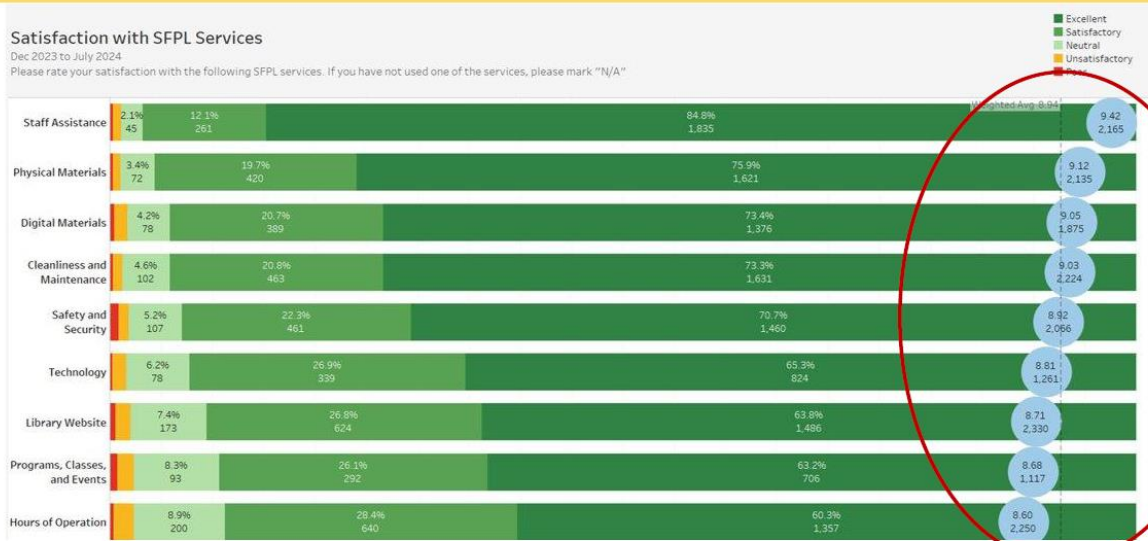
SFPL cardholders increased 6% from August 2023 to June 2024

- Q&A

- **Nora (GPA) – Can you go into more detail about the programming statistics?**
Lambert – The statistics go back ten years, showing year over year growth. The Library has recovered to 2014 levels, and we are striving to reach pre-pandemic 2019 levels.
- **Nora (GPA) – What is the biggest challenge in getting programming back to 2019 levels?**
Lambert – The ability to offer programs is affected by staffing. It took four years for the Library to get staffed up. We will continue to see more programs as our vacancies return to a normal rate of 9-10%.
Alcalá-Veráflor – It also takes time to get staff trained to do programs.

- **Nora (GPA) – Do we have data by branch?**
Alcalá-Veraflor – Yes, we can have the information by branch and put it in a presentation for the next meeting.
- **Lindy (GPA) – Can you share these statistics with the newspapers?**
Lambert – These statistics were shared early with this group and are usually found in our annual report. I'll talk to our Public Relations team.
- **Chuck (ORT) - Rather than take up time in this meeting, is there a better way to track the progress of work being done at the branches?**
Lambert – We appreciate you letting us know about any concerns you have at your branches, and you can always send an email to me (citylibrarian@sfpl.org) or Rebecca (chiefofbranches@sfpl.org). We will follow-up with the Facilities Department regarding the issues at Ortega Branch, such as the living roof, and the surveillance cameras.
- **A.J. (ANZ) – What kind of trainings does the Library have for high school students? It would be great if students could engage with tech. developers to gain a perspective on AI.**
Alcalá-Veraflor – The Library doesn't have formal trainings in tech., but we do participate in job readiness programs such as SF Youth Works, the Mayor's Youth Employment and Education Program (MYEEP), Opportunities for All, and Youth Engaged in Library Leadership (YELL). We have a wide range of tools and workshops to help support their studies and future career plans.
- **Nicky (OVI) – Will the Library bring back the weekly genealogy program?**
Alcalá-Veraflor – We were able to host a weekly program online, but since we are focusing on in-person programming, it is no longer weekly.

 - Lambert – Thank you to Nicky for speaking up in support of the library and to Nora for saying a few words about Marcia Popper. The times were different when Marcia first became a CNL member in the early 90's. CNL had to fight for the Library in order to prevent budget cuts and closures.

Career Online High School (COHS) – Natalie Enright

- **COHS** is a fully accredited program to earn a high school diploma and career certificates that is free for San Francisco residents and SFPL patrons.
- 100 graduates since launching in 2015.
- Key features:
 - Flexible
 - Competency-based, allowing students to retake assessments
 - Reduced educational trauma
 - Move at own pace
 - Assigned academic coach
- Strategies to increase participation:
 - Alumni network for mentoring and creating relationships
 - Partnerships with local businesses
 - Community outreach to meet students where they are
 - Marketing campaigns such as ads at the Department of Motor Vehicles
- Q&A
 - **Nicky (OVI) – Do students consider higher education after graduating?**
Enright – According to the exit survey, the students’ goals are mixed. Some have jobs. Some have master’s degrees from other countries and need the diploma to continue in their career. Some who hadn’t considered higher education change their minds. A large percentage of graduates go on to higher education.
 - **Heather (RIC) – Is the program available for English language learners?**
Enright – We are in the process of translating the program into other languages. We encourage folks to sign up for ESL tutoring with a Library volunteer.
 - **Judy (MER) – How is the curriculum determined?**
Enright – The Library isn’t a part of Career Online High School; we just host the program. The program details can be found on their website:

 - **Sonia (ING) – What are the acceptance requirements?**
Enright – Potential students fill out an online survey and if they meet the program requirements, they can enroll in a prerequisite course. Students need to complete the prerequisite course within two weeks and score 70% or higher before they can enroll in the program.
 - **Sonia (ING) – Is the program comparable to getting a GED?**
Enright – No, it is different. The program is fully accredited, and students receive a high school diploma. The GED tests are a group of subject tests certifying a high school graduate’s level of knowledge.
