## Skateboarding San Francisco

San Francisco has been a mecca for skateboarders for decades, with the Embarcadero a must-visit destination for skaters from around the globe. In this exhibition, spanning 50 years, 1975–2025, we celebrate street skateboarding in San Francisco and the unique urban features that make the city so skateable, namely the ubiquitous concrete ledges and epic hills. Defying easy definition and traditional classifications, skateboarding can be both a sport at the Olympics and an underground subculture, a way to connect with other skaters and surfaces and also a means of self-discovery through movement in space. Much of skateboarding's 21st-century appeal—embracing diverse communities, creative approaches to the city's built environment, music, fashion, slang, trick choice and style—come directly from San Francisco. *Skateboarding San Francisco* explores how a local activity made global impact. San Francisco has always been and remains a lodestar for skateboarders worldwide, where challenges are seen as appeals, surfaces beckon play and local lore is celebrated through the city's characteristic concrete assets and evolving, vibrant communities.

Featured in the exhibition will be archival photographs and skate magazines, skate decks, memorable skate videos, urban detritus from iconic skate spots like the Embarcadero ribbon and Hubba Hideout and interviews from world renowned skateboarders like Tommy Guerrero and Marbie Miller.

## Interview with Malik Seneferu

Malik Seneferu has dedicated his life to advancing social justice and Afrocentric resiliency in his community and beyond. The award-winning visual arts practice of this self-taught, San Francisco-based artist includes painting, sculpture, mixed media projects and public art commissions.

Seneferu began his career as a youth working with resident services in the Bayview Hunters Point and currently works with youth at the Phoenix Project Collaborative, where he is focused on providing life coaching for those struggling with traumatic life events.

He has created more than 10,000 artworks spanning a broad range of genres and mediums during his lifetime career and is consistently adding to his impressive canon. On exhibit in the African American Center through April is a sampling of this prolific work. Find out more about this artist in our Q&A.

### Q: How do you incorporate Black history into your art?

A: My work celebrates the existence of Black people throughout the time and existence of America and is inspired by Black history and all of the major events that have taken place by way of Black people.

### Q: Do you have a favorite Black history figure?

A: Some of my favorite figures are Reverend Nat Turner and Black abolitionists who decided that things should change for Black people in this country, then went to extremes for the sake of it. My favorites are also artists such as Ruth Waddy and Sargent Johnson, to name a few.

### Q: What do you hope people will come away with after viewing your exhibit?

A: I hope to facilitate cultural exchange and dialogue, allowing artists from different backgrounds to share their perspectives and engage with diverse audiences; to inspire visitors and offer educational opportunities, helping them to appreciate and understand different art forms, historical contexts and artistic techniques; and to challenge viewers and stimulate critical thinking by presenting thought-provoking pieces that explore complex themes or current societal issues.

## Meet the HistoryMakers!

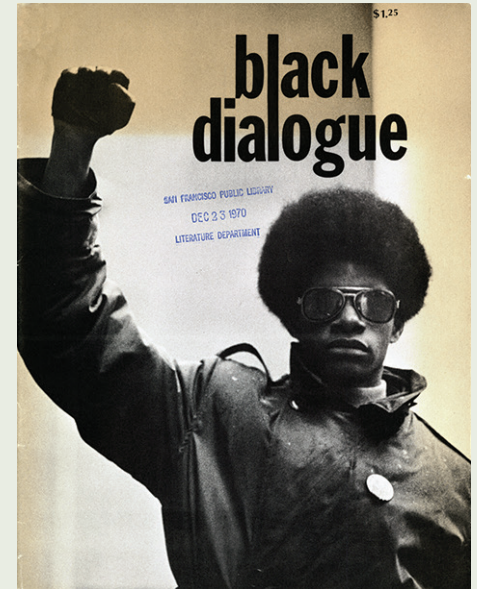
**S**FPL is pleased to offer access to the HistoryMakers, the nationally acclaimed video oral history collection documenting the Black experience in the United States.

A treasure trove of Black history and primary source material, HistoryMakers was founded by former television producer Julieanna Richardson in 1999 with the goal of capturing the important stories of accomplished African Americans.

The video archive showcases a virtual “who’s who” of prominent African Americans in nearly 3,000 video-recorded interviews, including San Francisco luminaries such as Willie Brown, Belva Davis, Danny Glover and the Library’s very own Effie Lee Morris.

Search for “Makers” in the database by name, state or themes discussed in the interview. Find interviews with activists, politicians, lawyers, medical professionals, sports figures, religious leaders and more. Video clips are broken up into short digestible segments.

## Collections Corner: The Black Arts Movement and Revolutionary Little Magazines

In 1965, a group of Black students at San Francisco State University launched *Black Dialogue*, a publication dedicated to the legacy of Malcolm X, to provide a platform for fellow students, artists, writers and thinkers within the Black community. The following year, the poet and editor of *Black Dialogue*, Dingane Joe Goncalves, started the *Journal of Black Poetry*. Alongside *Soulbook* (Berkeley), *Black Dialogue* and *Journal of Black Poetry* formed a collective of influential literary journals or “little magazines” that emerged from the San Francisco Bay Area. As part of the Black Arts Movement, these publications gave voice to poets and writers including Amiri Baraka, Sonia Sanchez, Nikki Giovanni, Carolyn Rodgers, Audre Lorde, Kamau Brathwaite, Clarence Major, Julian Bond, Calvin Hernton, Ishmael Reed, Askia Muhammad Touré and Sarah Webster Fabio. Both journals were published by Julian Richardson of Marcus Books, the oldest continuously operating Black-owned and -operated bookstore in the United States, now located in Oakland.

The Book Arts and Special Collections department holds a number of little magazines from the Black Arts Movement in the Little Maga/Zine collection. You can view the *Journal of Black Poetry*, *Black Dialogue* and *Soulbook* as part of *That’s Rad: San Francisco Bay Area Zine Culture*, an exhibit opening March 15 in the Main Library, 6th Floor.

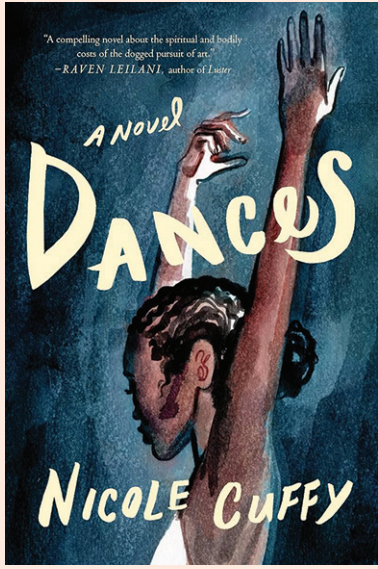

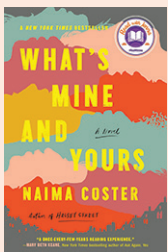
