Join us for San Francisco's Night of Ideas 2025, where the theme "(Un)Common Ground" invites us to reflect on the individual and shared challenges facing our country and the global community in a rapidly changing world.

This year's theme explores the vital role of civil society in mediating our differences and charting a shared destiny. It challenges us to reconsider the values that form the foundation of our communities—whether territorial, social or emotional—and how we can repair our social fabric amid increasing polarization. How can we rebuild a sense of the common good and what is necessary to realize it in a time of deep division? In an era dominated by AI and social networks, how do we forge meaningful interpersonal connections and preserve the essence of shared values? How can we find common ground, if there is any?

We also welcome back Afternoon of Ideas, a family program ahead of the main event welcoming younger generations to participate in crafts, performances and workshops with popular children's book authors, artists, performers and educators.

Learn About California's History with Native Peoples and Hear Indigenous Perspectives

Created in 2019 following Governor Newsom's formal apology for the genocide committed against California Native Americans, the California Truth and Healing Council (CTHC) investigates the lasting effects of this history. This month, Tribal Affairs Secretary Christina Snider and Deputy Tribal Affairs Secretary & Special Counsel Loretta Miranda from the Governor's Office on Tribal Affairs will present for the very first time the findings of the CTHC. The official report features oral histories, historical documents and recommendations for restorative justice to clarify the past and alter California's historical narrative.

Additionally, learn about the documentary *We're Still Here*, directed by Emmy-winner Jacob Kornbluth, which follows the years-long work of the Council, highlighting personal narratives of Native people across California.

Did You Know: SFPL Has Seed Lending Libraries



Starting your garden can be a cinch with the Library's seed lending libraries! Located at the Bayview, Potrero and Portola branches, these libraries, located in old-fashioned card catalogs, provide open access to vegetable and flower seeds, such as sunflowers, tomatoes, kale, cilantro and parsley. Supply varies per location.

Borrowing seeds from the Library is simple: patrons select seeds from the collection and plant their seeds. After they have harvested their crops, they may save the seeds from the heartiest and healthiest of their harvest and return the seeds to the same Library.

Patrons 18 and over may access the seed libraries anytime by asking at the front desk. Patrons younger than 18 may use the seed library when a parent or guardian is present, or with a note from a parent, guardian, teacher or community gardener.

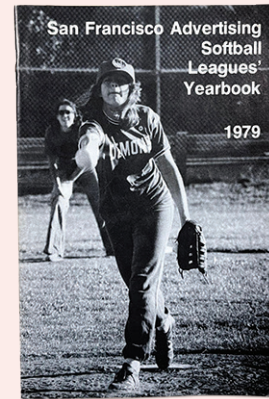


Discover More of HERstory with Our Databases

In celebration of Women's History Month, several databases are taking the spotlight: *Contemporary Women's Issues*, *LGBTQ+ Archives of Sexuality and Gender*, *Health & Fitness Magazine Archive*, *Harper's Bazaar Archive*, *Vogue Archive*, *Women's Magazine Archive I & II*, *Fashion Archives* and *Women's Wear Daily*.

To access, just log in to sfpl.org using your library card number/username and pin/password. Click on Research & Learn and go to Articles and Databases. Then proceed to find the database you want by using letter filter or by topic: for example, People.

For each database, search features allow you to narrow or broaden your search using basic and advanced searches and filters (date, type of periodical, subject and more). Access to the full text of most articles is available. If not, the citation is provided—this information is helpful for accessing the print version. Happy searching and reading!

Collections Corner: Pitch-Perfect: Women's Softball

Bonnie Russell (1943–2018) was a lesbian photographer, graphic designer and dedicated softball player. Her collection of memorabilia contains photographs, team rosters and ephemera related to her involvement in women's softball, including the Advertisement League's Headliners team and the lesbian team, the Cracker Jacks. There are even some uniforms!

Russell played a key role in team activities from 1976 to 1986. This collection documents games and other gatherings, illustrating the sense of community that women's softball fosters.

New Freedom Letters Collection Now Available



We are excited to announce the addition of several remarkable titles from the publisher Freedom Letters to the International Center's Russian and Ukrainian collections. Founded in April 2023 by Georgy Urushadze, the former director of Russia's prestigious Big Book Award, Freedom Letters is an independent publishing house based outside Russia. Its passionate aim is to amplify voices that challenge Russian state censorship and promote anti-war and opposition perspectives, focusing on works that cannot be published within Russia due to government restrictions.

Among our recent acquisitions are Sergey Davydov's groundbreaking queer novel *Springfield* and Dmitry Bykov's *VZ*, a critical, thought-provoking portrait of Volodymyr Zelenskyy that also explores the deep-rooted conflict between archaism and progress, offering readers a profound reflection on contemporary global tensions. These titles embody the publisher's unwavering commitment to freedom of expression and have been enthusiastically recommended by our readers.

Later this year, the International Center, located on the 3rd Floor of the Main Library, will host a notable book display to coincide with the third anniversary of Putin's invasion of Ukraine—a poignant occasion to spotlight these vital works.

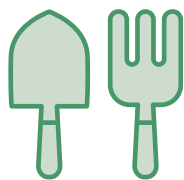

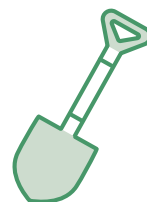

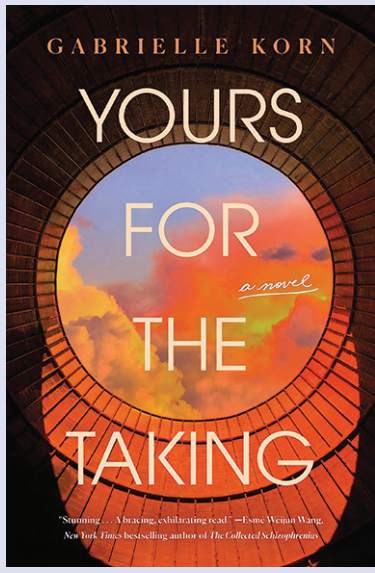

Gabrielle Korn's *Yours for the Taking*

In 2050, when climate change has rendered the outside world virtually uninhabitable, survival is guaranteed only to those accepted into The Inside Project—massive weather-safe structures funded by corporate sponsors and built atop the ruins of cities.

Jacqueline Millender, a billionaire feminist icon with a hidden agenda, envisions her Inside as a utopia for women only. The novel follows three interconnected characters caught in Jacqueline's web: Ava, who enters the Inside alone after her girlfriend is denied admission; Shelby, a working-class business major swept into Jacqueline's glamorous world as her personal assistant; and Olympia, a med-school graduate recruited to oversee the health department. As cracks in Jacqueline's system begin to show, the trio must grapple with betrayal, survival and their own complicity in a society built on exploitation.

Volunteer Spotlight + Q&A

At the heart of our organization is a dedicated and eclectic group of volunteers who are crucial to our mission of supporting the SFPL. From board members guiding our vision to volunteers on the ground at every Friends Book Sale, these individuals help power our organization. Like other Friends organizations nationwide, we fundraise through used book sales, but in San Francisco—a city with a deep, unmatched passion for literature—our efforts take on special significance. Every year, we receive over 350 tons of books (more than 700,000 lbs!). Our dedicated warehouse volunteers are essential in sorting and preparing these books for their next chapter—whether that’s being sold online, in our bookstore at the Main, at Monthly Book Sales or at our Book Sale Block Party or else supplied to independent bookstore partners or donated to other nonprofits. Among them are longtime volunteers Joan, Myer and Duffy, whose experiences over the past two decades highlight the profound impact Friends of the SFPL and libraries have had on their lives.

Q: What first inspired you to support Friends of the SFPL?

Joan & Myer: “Libraries have always been important,” Myer answers confidently. When they were growing up in agricultural towns—Joan in Omaha, Nebraska, and Myer in Salinas, California—libraries became a sanctuary. “We didn’t have encyclopedias or newspapers at home,” Myer recalls. He lights up with a cheek-to-cheek grin. “The library was my friend.” The couple first met in San Francisco and have been together since 1971. They have volunteered at Friends of the SFPL for over 13 years.

Duffy: “Since I’ve always been an avid reader, supporting the Library was a natural choice. I started volunteering about 17 years ago, and I’ve loved it ever since.” Before Duffy became a volunteer at Friends of the SFPL back in 2008, she was a Volunteer Manager at the Art Museums of San Francisco.

Joan, Myer and Duffy are part of a Thursday afternoon cohort at our Donation Center in Potrero Hill, San Francisco.

Q: How has volunteering for us enriched your life?

Joan & Myer: “We have seen the SFPL evolve into one of the highest-ranked public libraries in the country.” The couple reminisce about the lifelong friendships they’ve built through library love and their admiration for how the library system has evolved. “It’s rewarding to know that our volunteer work and the Friends’ Book Program help fund programs and children’s literacy initiatives.”

Duffy: “It feels good to give back. I thought books might go out of style, but they’re more wanted now than ever.” Although Duffy prefers to read on her Kindle, she agrees that there is “something special about holding a book and turning the pages. It’s an experience you can’t replicate.”

Q: If you could describe Friends of the SFPL in one word, what would it be?

Joan & Myer: “Essential.” Libraries are true community pillars.

Duffy: “Important.” Reading, recycling and reusing books keeps knowledge alive.
