Financing Renovation of the branch was funded by a \$105.9 million bond measure

passed by voters in November 2000 and \$500,000 in private funds raised by the Friends of the San Francisco Public Library for furniture, fixtures and equipment. The Branch Library Improvement Program (BLIP) is the largest capital improvement campaign in the history of the San Francisco Public Library. BLIP calls for 17 branches to be renovated, four leased facilities to be replaced with City-owned buildings, two branches to be replaced with new buildings, and one brand-new branch in Mission Bay.

- A variety of seating in lounge areas, at tables and at computers
- Ergonomically designed dedicated staff work areas

- Self pick up of reserved materials
- Preeminent Japanese language collection
- New community room with built-in media equipment for library programs
- New secure landscaped garden

Technologically updated

- 23 public computers for children, teens, and adults: 8 exclusively for the library online catalog and multiple databases and 15 additionally with word processing and spreadsheet software plus access to the Internet (there were only 6 public computers before the renovation).
- 12 laptop computers for public computer classes
- Wireless (Wi-Fi) access to the Internet
- Express checkout machines

Environmentally sound

- Reuse of existing building
- Energy efficient mechanical and lighting systems
- Improved air quality with low VOC emissions
- Durable materials with long life spans
- Raised access floor system allows for future change without construction demolition debris or extensive library down time
- Flooring made from renewable natural materials
- Increased wall insulation
- Insulated window glazing to reduce heat gain and loss
- Operable windows for natural ventilation
- Maximum use of natural light
- Window shades to control light levels
- Increased landscaping
- Drought resistant native grasses and plants
- New bicycle racks
- Transit friendly location (MUNI lines 2, 4, 22, 24, & 38)
