
Bernal Heights Branch Library

A library deposit station was established on Cortland Avenue in 1920. As the neighborhood and library grew, the Bernal Heights branch moved down the block in 1936. When that site proved inadequate the neighbors lobbied for a new building. The present branch was built on the site of the original Bernal School and was the 21st in the San Francisco library system. It was funded by the Work Projects Administration and dedicated on October 21, 1940. The branch was renovated and reopened in 2010 as a two-story library building.
