Established in 1927 as a library deposit station, the Portola Branch was the 14th branch in San Francisco. It was located in leased sites up and down San Bruno Avenue until it settled in 2009 in a newly constructed building at the corner of Bacon and Goettingen streets. Its stunning glass shutter public artwork, *California Wildflowers*, created by artist Dana Zed, was inspired by the history of the garden nurseries that used to be located in the neighborhood.
